## Course Discipline and Number: ART 115 Course Title: Painting I

Year: 2019-2020 Credit Hours: 3

# **Course Description**

Painting I provides an introduction to the methods and techniques of various painting media. Principles of color, form, and composition are studied with an emphasis on experimentation. ART 115 fulfills the SUNY General Education requirement in the Arts. Prerequisites: Prior completion or concurrent enrollment in MATH 090, ENGL 099, and RDNG 099 if required by placement testing. 3 Cr. (2 Lec., 2 Lab.) Fall and spring semesters.

## **Course Context/Audience**

Painting I can be used as the studio elective for the Graphic Design/Computer Graphics program requirement.

## **Basic Skills/Entry Level Expectations**

Writing: W1 Student should be taking ENGL 099 (if needed). The course requires very limited writing, e.g., short written responses of a paragraph or less.

Math: M1 Taking MATH 090 (if needed) – Course requires limited use of very basic mathematical skills.

Reading: R1 Course may be taken concurrently with RDNG 099.

## **Course Goals**

- 1. Students will communicate ideas through painting.
- 2. Students will gain experience working with a variety of materials, techniques, and design principles used in painting.
- 3. Students will participate in critiques of paintings.

Students will be exposed to a general overview of the history of painting.

## **Course Objectives/Topics**

Students will understand a general history of painting.	10%
Students will experiment with the techniques used for painting media. These include: acrylic, watercolor, mixed media, and collage.	40%
Students will demonstrate the ability to apply color mixing/theory, composition, value, and texture in their paintings.	40%
Students will demonstrate the ability to stretch and prepare a canvas for painting.	5%
Students will develop the skills needed to critique paintings.	5%
