**Course Title: First Aid and Safety Education**

**Year: 2020-2021**  
**Credit Hours: 3**

### **Course Description**

This is a study of the typical injuries, illnesses, and emergency situations received in workplace, recreation, home and community, as well as the corresponding first aid skills needed to manage those emergencies until Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel arrive. This course emphasizes ways to prevent such scenarios and helps students confront their fears of stepping forward to provide assistance. The corresponding American Red Cross certificate(s) in CPR and First Aid are awarded for additional fee upon satisfactory completion of the requirements. Prerequisites: RDNG 099 if required by placement testing; prior completion or concurrent enrollment in ENGL 100. 3 Cr. (3 Lec.) Fall and spring semesters.

### **Course Context/Audience**

This course is required in the Recreation Leadership A.S. degree program. It may be used to satisfy an unrestricted elective requirement by students who want to become more informed about typical injuries and illnesses as well as about how to prevent and treat them in order to create a safer environment for themselves or their loved ones.

### **Basic Skills/Entry Level Expectations**

**Writing:** WC College level writing skills are required. See course co-requisites or pre-requisites.

**Math:** M0 Course requires very little or no math.

**Reading:** R2 Before taking this course, students must have a C or better in RDNG 099 or assessment indicating that RDNG 099 was not required.

**Other:** Students should be comfortable performing skills in front of other students and the instructor.

### **Course Goals**

As a result of completing this course, students will:

1. Understand the definition of Emergency First Aid and its limitations.
2. Understand when & how to use the Emergency Medical Service systems found in communities.
3. Understand & perform life support methods used at this level of training.
4. Be able to identify hazards & ways to prevent accidents in the workplace, recreation, home and community settings.
5. Develop the ability to identify unsafe situations or situations that pose significant health risks to infants, children, and adults.
6. Obtain First Aid techniques to accommodate a wide variety of injury situations.

7. Be able to improvise when the standard equipment is not available.

**Course Objectives/Topics**

<b>Objective/Topic</b>	<b># Hours</b>
Students will know the importance of deciding to take action in an emergency and how to organize a scene of an emergency.	3 Hours
Students will know the key structures in each body system, how each system functions normally, how it interacts with another system, and how to recognize a system failure.	3 Hours
Students will be able to perform a conscious and unconscious victim check.	4 Hours
Students will be able to perform adult and pediatric cardiac emergency care skills.	10 Hours
Students will know the differences between adult and pediatric cardiac emergency care skills.	2 Hours
Students will know how to perform reaching and moving assists on land and in the water.	3 Hours
Students will know the signs/symptoms and perform care for different body part specific injuries.	12 Hours
Students will be able to recognize and care for various special emergency situations. (i.e. poisoning, bites & stings, heat & cold, etc.)	6 Hours
Students will know what basic supplies should be in a first aid kit in order to create one when needed.	2 Hours

They will learn how to check the scene of an emergency and then the victim(s) to determine if further help is required. Students will learn how to check victims who have life threatening conditions as well as victims with minor injuries or sudden illnesses. They will also learn how to care for these conditions. Additionally, students will be given information on living a healthy lifestyle as well as ways to prevent many common accidents that can cause injury.</p>

Through the use of lectures, video presentations and classroom interaction, students will learn how to recognize and take action in an emergency. They will learn that their actions, or inactions, can have profound effects on others.</p>
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**Instructional Methods**

The following teaching strategies and skill-practice sessions have been designed by the American Red Cross (revised 2006) in order to address the required course content:

- (1) Assigned readings from the ARC Responding to Emergencies, Participant’s Manual,
- (2) Small and large-group exercises,
- (3) Prepared lectures w/handouts,
- (4) Problem-solving scenarios,
- (5) Skill practice sessions: video demonstrations, instructor-led practice, and reciprocal practice,
- (6) ARC required written and skill tests and exams.
