Course Discipline and Number: MUSI 101 Course Title: Music Appreciation

Year: 2020-2021 Credit Hours: 3

Course Description

This course is designed to help students develop their understanding of music as a language of human expression. The melodic, rhythmic, harmonic form, and historical significance of selected pieces are examined. Students are introduced to a wide variety of music from primitive to modern times and develop the skill to recognize patterns, forms, and styles found in music. MUSI 101 fulfills the SUNY General Education requirement in the Arts. Prerequisite: RDNG 099 if required by placement testing. 3 Cr. (3 Lec.) Fall and spring semesters.

Course Context/Audience

This is a liberal arts course open to all students. Students completing the course have sufficient exposure and training to continue studying music for their minor or major at a 4-year college.

- **Reading:** R2 Before taking this course, students must have a C or better in RDNG 099 or assessment indicating that RDNG 099 was not required.

Course Goals

1. Students will explore selected pieces that are appealing for their melodic, rhythmic, harmonic form and historical significance.

2. Students will seek an opportunity to apply their skills and knowledge developed in appreciation of delightful excursions through the musical world.

- 3. Students will be introduced to the musical terms for revealing the meaning of the music language.
- 4. Students will develop the skill to recognize patterns, forms and styles found in music.
