Course Discipline and Number: FITN 221 Course Title: Snow Sports Instructor's Course

Year: 2024-2025 Credit Hours: 1

Course Description

This course is an introduction to teaching skiing and snowboarding professionally. A certified member of the Professional Ski Instructors of America Association at Greek Peak Snow Sports School, in Virgil, N.Y. teaches the course. Snow sport school policies and procedures and progressions in learning and teaching skiing and snowboarding skills are covered. Additional fee required. Prerequisites: Prior completion or concurrent enrollment in ENGL 099 and RDNG 099 if required by placement testing. 1 Cr. (2 Lab.) Spring semester.

Course Context/Audience

This course is an unrestricted elective.

Basic Skills/Entry Level Expectations

- Writing: W1 Student should be taking ENGL 099 (if needed). The course requires very limited writing, e.g., short written responses of a paragraph or less.
- Math: M0 Course requires very little or no math.
- Reading: R1 Course may be taken concurrently with RDNG 099.

Course Goals

This course will provide the student with the necessary information and training to become an accomplished skier / rider. Successful completion of this course may lead to employment at ski resorts anywhere. Snow Sports School employees are constantly provided ongoing clinics in order to continue learning and to become more effective teachers. The higher skill level, more experienced employees move from instructors to supervisor positions and advance in responsibilities and pay. Learning to work in a for profit leisure delivery system will expose any student in any major to all aspects of the ski industry. The business side of sports is highly attractive, provides jobs, opportunities for meeting people in an environment which attracts millions of visitors and yields the work experiences which will contribute to a meaningful life in other areas as well. People with second languages have an advantage in recreational / learning settings specific to destination user groups such as bus tour groups and special events or assignments.
