Course Title: Hispanic Literature and Culture I Credit Hours: 3

Course Description

This is an advanced-intermediate course, intended to be a bridge to upper level literature courses Major emphasis is placed on helping students to improve their oral communication skills and reading comprehension. Students continue to explore different aspects of the cultures, history, and current events of the Spanish speaking world. Students are expected to be able to communicate in the present, past, and future tenses as well in the indicative, subjunctive and imperative moods in Spanish. The class is conducted exclusively in Spanish. Prerequisites: SPAN 202 or equivalent; prior completion or concurrent enrollment in ENGL101. 3 Cr. (3 Lec.) Occasionally.

Course Context/Audience

This is an advanced-intermediate level Spanish course which will emphasize speaking, reading, writing, and listening comprehension. Students will study Hispanic culture and history. They will be introduced to the literature of important Latin American and Spanish authors and will learn to write critical reaction papers. This course is appropriate for students wishing to travel abroad and for heritage speakers and native Spanish speakers whose proficiency in Spanish makes taking lower level language courses inappropriate.

Basic Skills/Entry Level Expectations

Writing: WC3 Prior completion or concurrent enrollment in ENGL 101. The course requires short written responses

and/or short papers.

Math: M0 Course requires very little or no math.

Reading: R4 RDNG 116 if required by placement testing.

Course Goals

By completing this course, students will

- 1. Research a topics to enable them to apply the knowledge they acquire about Hispanic culture and society to better interpret the Hispanic literary texts they read.
- 2. Improve their oral proficiency and listening comprehension skills.
- 3. Improve their writing and reading comprehension skills.

Instructional Methods

The course format will entail discussions about the poems, short stories and cultural readings being studied. Students will work together as a class, in small groups and individually. Participation is critical. Students are expected to come to class prepared and actively participate by expressing their opinions, perspectives and knowledge.
