Course Discipline and Number: SPMT 270 Course Title: Sport Facilities/Venue Management

Year: 2023-2024 Credit Hours: 3

Course Description

The processes of designing, planning, and managing public and private sport, and other public assembly facilities are addressed. Principles of facility planning, design, construction, financial and legal management, and operational issues of public and private arenas and multiple-purpose sport facilities are highlighted. Prerequisites: ACCT 101; SPMT 150; MATH 090 and RDNG 116 if required by placement testing; prior completion or concurrent enrollment in ENGL 101. 3 Cr. (3 Lec.) Fall and spring semesters.

Course Context/Audience

This is a survey course most appropriate for Sport Management students. It is a required course to be recommended for the third semester of the sport management program. Its focus is on the functions of management in terms of operating and financing public assembly facilities, and special sport event venues.

Basic Skills/Entry Level Expectations

- Math: M2 Completed MATH 090 (if needed) Course requires only the use of basic mathematical skills.
- **Reading:** R4 Before taking this course, students must satisfactorily complete RDNG 116 or have assessment indicating that no reading course was required.

Course Goals

Students will gain an understanding of facility management skills.

Students will identify and comprehend the range of career options in the field of sport venue/facilities management.

Students will demonstrate and understanding of the nature and degree of the impact of facilities on the environment. Students will demonstrate an ability to identify and discuss key ethical and economic issues in the development of sport facilities.
